"This fight has been a long time coming and builds on all the past battles that we have won together through the years," said Vice President John Norbury.

This deal covers thousands of units across the city and the first project has already begun in East Harlem on the largest residential passive house building in the country. Business Manager Mike Prohaska said, "Our agreement is setting a new precedent for how to build permanently affordable housing with union labor, hire locally and create more pathways to the middle class."

The NYC Building Trades also signed a \$40 billion dollar five-year Project Labor Agreement with the Mayor last year which sets a new precedent of community hiring for the rest of the nation. Finally, Governor Cuomo has announced a new \$50 billion plan for public infrastructure and we look forward to negotiating an agreement for this work.

First and foremost, I am proud that the other trustees and I stepped up to send a 13th check to retirees at the end of the year and granted a



credit of up to 300 hours of work in 2020 for active members to qualify for the 2021 health-care eligibility requirement. We worked diligently to make sure our funds have strong reserves so we can support our membership during extraordinary circumstances like now.

No matter what, this pandemic has spotlighted Local 79 at its finest. Our union is full of true working-class heroes that have demonstrated the true power of commitment and solidarity in action. This is not the time for us to let up and we must continue to be vigilant in bringing our country back better and stronger.

Our out-of-work list dropped below 350 as of our January Membership Meeting. Work hours have been increasing since the shutdown in the Spring and our hours worked are in line with our historical numbers. This is an impressive feat given the challenges we have faced.

We should all be very proud of our apprenticeship and training program. Since the beginning of the pandemic, we have offered a wide-array of virtual classes and in the Fall launched essential in-person instruction. We have also brought in new apprentices and made sure our members are prepared for new Site Safety Training requirements going into effect. Our apprentices are the future of our union. That is why I am proud to announce that over the last 10 years we had an over 80% retention rate of graduated apprentices and this year we hit a milestone of over 40 graduates with 20+ years in the local.

I thank everyone who voted in the 2020 election. American democracy is built on the recognition of our right to self-governance and your vote is the fulfilment and expression of that freedom. New York City has a crucial election cycle coming up this June with primaries determining our next mayor, comptroller, Manhattan DA, borough presidents and the majority of the city council. LiUNA's Marty Walsh Appointed Labor Secretary



In early January, newly elected President Joe Biden announced his appointment of LiUNA member Marty Walsh as Secretary of Labor. Marty started his career at Laborers' Local 223 and was later

head of the Boston Building Trades Council before his successful election to become Mayor of Boston. "Marty is a working-class warrior," said Chaz Rynkiewicz, Executive Board member. On his first day in office, Biden fired the anti-union head of the NLRB who led the lawsuit against Local 79's use of an inflatable rat. Biden also signed an executive order that stated it is "the policy of the United States to encourage union organizing and collective bargaining."
